### **Bookshare.org Library Now Free to All U.S. Students with Qualifying Disabilities**

Bookshare.org library provides print disabled people in the United States with legal access to over 38,775 books and 150 periodicals that are converted to Braille, large print or digital formats for text to speech audio. Membership is free for students with a learning disability who register and submit proof of their disability.

Provider of recorded textbooks. Accessible audiobook library for students with disabilities such as visual impairment or dyslexia that make reading standard print difficult or impossible. Producer of accessible educational materials for students with disabilities such as a visual impairment or dyslexia. Contains content from literature and history to math and the sciences, at all academic levels, from kindergarten through post-graduate and professional. Fee-based membership; proof of disability required.

### ***Universal Digital Library***

Their mission is to create a Universal Library which will foster creativity and free access to all human knowledge. Computer scientists at Carnegie Mellon University began an initiative a decade ago to get 1.5 million books online with free access to everyone.

The U.S., China and India have each contributed \$10 million to the project. More than half of the books are out of copyright or scanned with the permission of their respective copyright holders. As of Nov. 2007, the library contained books published in 20 languages, including English, Italian, French, German Chinese, Arabic, Persian, and the southern Indian language of Telugu. Especially useful for students enrolled in foreign language courses.
